BPSA BBQ Fund Raiser a Success

Wiarton's Bruce Peninsula Sportsmen's Association is mostly known for stocking fish to beef up the sports fishery. On July 14th BEEF was a main attraction at the non-profit club's largest fund raiser of the year.

The event at our clubhouse west of Wiarton, was the annual pork and beef barbecue which this year attracted more than 250 guests, up significantly from last year. Under the direction of hatchery manager Ray Marklevitz, BPSA's expert "grilling team" prepared exceptionally tasty and tender pork and beef. Add in all the trimmings and you have a stupendous main course.

A taste-tempting selection of homemade desserts capped off the fine dining experience. At 16 bucks a person it was a bargain. It took more than 35 BPSA member volunteers to mount the event. Under the direction of barbecue chair Murray Garniss, there was the renowned "grilling team", the food preparers, the servers, the kitchen team, the setup and take-down folks, the prize-draw team and the parking team. It all went smoothly.

Grey-Bruce conservation groups praised by MNRF Minister

Ontario's new Minister of Natural Resources & Forestry, Jeff Yurek, MPP for Elgin-Middlesex-London, had high praise for volunteer clubs that stock fish at a visit to Bruce Peninsula Sportsmen's Association's clubhouse on Aug. 24.

During his visit, Yurek promised to "transform" his ministry so it will be more responsive and engaged with local conservation club members.

Yurek has only been Minister of Natural Resources & Forestry for a few weeks. He previously served as the Conservative Party critic of the MNRF. Now as Minister, he was on the job in Grey-Bruce last Friday, being shown around by Bill Walker, MPP for Bruce-Grey-Owen Sound. The two visited fish hatcheries, met with conservation groups and the Minister officially opened the 31st annual Owen Sound Salmon Spectacular fishing derby, which runs until September 1.

At the Wiarton-based Bruce Peninsula Sportsmen's Association (BPSA) hatchery, Yurek congratulated the club for its 40 years of fish stocking and stream rehabilitation projects. As the Minister wrapped up his two-hour visit he

encouraged club members to "keep up the good work."

"You folks are doing great things," he said.

Since the sixties BPSA has stocked more than 4-million rainbow and brown trout in Georgian Bay. The volunteer club is one of 40 hatcheries in the Ontario Community Hatchery Program.

Yurek also promised to make the MNRF easier to deal with club members.

"We will be better at consulting with your volunteer clubs. We hope to offer better customer service including streamlining the way we deal with conservation and sporting groups such as BPSA, the Lake Huron Fishing Club and the Sydenham Sportsmen's Association," he said. These organizations have a long history of stocking to support local recreational fisheries.

The Minister met with BPSA fish committee members to discuss ways to improve the survival rate of stocked fish, cut red tape for community hatchery operators by streamlining the hatchery licencing process, and other topics.

Jim Martell, President of BPSA, thanked Yurek for visiting the Wiarton club. Martell called the Minister's approach "refreshing and encouraging for our club, which looks forward to an era of co-operation and positivity as we continue to work on our conservation projects."

After Yurek and Walker visited BPSA, Walker issued a news release reflecting on the new Minister's visit.

Local constituents were very pleased Yurek chose Bruce and Grey for his first official ministerial visit, Walker said.

"This was an opportunity to connect and allow Minister Yurek to see first-hand how important recreational fishing is in our area, especially the positive economic impact," Walker said.

In addition to visiting BPSA, Yurek also met with members of the Sydenham Sportsmen's Association, Quality Deer Management Association, Hepworth Anglers Club, and Outdoor Adventures, Walker's news release said.

Conservation Club completes hatchery improvements:

The Wiarton based Bruce Peninsula Sportsmen's Association (BPSA) has completed a ten-thousand dollar improvement to its hatchery. The hatchery walls and ceiling have been spray-foamed. The insulation keeps the building cooler in summer and warmer in winter. That in turn improves the health of fish being raised there. Part of the work was supported by a donation from one of our neighbouring clubs the Barrow Bay and District Sport Fishing Association.

The insulation spray was done professionally. Tarp-laying to prepare the hatchery so fish were protected during the spraying, was done by the following volunteer BPSA members: Ray Marklevitz, Gord Smith, Al Sutter, Murray Garniss, Wayne Musselman, Cory and Stan McNeil.



During the spraying a long tube from a truck outside the hatchery, fed the spray material to a masked worker inside who applied the foam.

Some BPSA Fish Committee members took time out to inspect the foam-spray job. They declared the project a success. During their visit on a hot summer night, the building was noticeably much cooler than it would have been before the work was done.

BPSA is mostly known for stocking fish to beef up the sports fishery. Our volunteer members work year round to raise and stock thousands of rainbow and brown trout which become part of what's called a "put-and-take" fishery. We put the fish in the lake. You catch them.

Half of the cost of operating our state of the art hatchery is covered by the Ontario Community Hatchery Program (CHP) that controls a network of 40 volunteer run Ontario hatcheries. This program is run by the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters under the guidance of the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry. Our fish stocking program is the longest operating volunteer run stocking effort in Ontario. We began improving the Grey-Bruce recreational fishery in the early sixties.

The next major BPSA project takes place August 22nd when members help raise the giant tent, headquarters for the 31st annual Owen Sound Salmon Spectacular fishing derby. They pull down the tent September 3rd. The 10-day Salmon Spectacular Festival is the largest event of the year in Grey-Bruce. It is considered the largest family fishing festival in North America. BPSA members will also volunteer at the Great Lakes Fishery Commission display at the tent, showcasing the commission's successful multi-million dollar sea lamprey control program.

Sea lamprey Invasive Campaign

The Great Lakes Fishery Commission (GLFC) has completed year-5 of its Sea lamprey invasive species information campaign in Ontario's Grey-Bruce region. The Commission's display at the annual Owen Sound Salmon Spectacular Fishing Derby tent, ran for the 10 days of the giant festival, considered the largest event of the year in our region.

Representatives of the Commission, Canada's Department of Fisheries and Oceans and the Bruce Peninsula Sportsmen's Association worked the booth. The main focus being, the battle against the sea lamprey.



This invasive parasite with no predators in the Great Lakes, sucks the blood out of fish killing 6 out of 7 fish they attack. Each sea lamprey is capable of killing 40-pounds of fish during their 12-18 month feeding period.

At the GLFC display young and old gathered to see up close these snake-like creatures. The message to the public was "we have sea lamprey under control, and we continue developing new methods of keeping their numbers down to record low levels."



Several anglers brought in fish with lamprey attached. The live ones were added to our sea lamprey collection.

The Great Lakes Fishery Commission is the lead group on the 4-million dollar renovation of Denny's Dam on the Saugeen River at Southampton which is expected to be completed within the next few weeks. The work was designed to prevent sea lamprey from swimming over the dam and heading upstream to spawn.

Hepworth Anglers Restoration Project

The Hepworth Anglers Club resumed the sixth year of the Spring Creek Restoration Project by planting trees along the stream banks. Later two riffle beds and aeration structures were constructed in the stream. Additional cover was provided by embedding cedar trees/root wads into the stream banks and by opening up side channels. Summer students Colin Burchell and Edyn Hillman assisted with the restoration work, including working with Dr James Hamilton (Wilfrid Laurier University) monitoring equipment sites and gauging water flows. Tom MacDonald was the local contractor for the 2018 portion of the Restoration Project, which was conducted under the guidance of Chris Cummings, Matrix Solutions. Bio mass studies were taken to measure the results of the past years of restoration.
