

Rankin River Resources (Larry Isbester)

Larry Isbester give a brief overview of the Native Land Claim which went to trial April 26th. The excerpt below is taken from the Owen Sun Times.

Peninsula land claim trial includes local hearings (Written by Scott Dunn)

The Saugeen Ojibway Nation's multibillion-dollar peninsula land claim and aboriginal title waterbed claim will include hearings at Saugeen and Neyaashiinigmiing.

The trial is to begin in Toronto today and most of the 200-plus days scheduled will be done there.

But hearings will move to the Cape Croker Community Centre April 29 to May 3 at Neyaashiinigmiing, and to the James Mason Memorial Cultural & Recreational Centre May 13 to 17, at Saugeen First Nation, a news release from SON said Wednesday.

On Tuesday Chief Greg Nadjiwon, of the Chippewas of Nawash Unceeded First Nation, where the first local hearings will be held, said he was feeling "positive" about the claim.

It seeks \$80 billion in compensation, plus \$10 billion in punitive damages, though any compensation and damages would be considered in a separate, subsequent hearing, SON lawyer Cathy Guirguis said Tuesday.

The SON news release says it will take two to three years to complete the trial, much longer than Nadjiwon's estimate the day before of possibly 12 to 16 months.

There are two parts to the SON legal action.

First there's a Bruce Peninsula land claim based on an alleged breach of fiduciary duty by the Crown in its handling of former Saugeen Ojibwa lands since 1854, when Treaty 72 was signed and most of the peninsula was opened to non-aboriginal settlement.

SON's claim seeks the return of the approximately 10 per cent of land on the peninsula still owned by the Crown, including the national park, all lake and rivers, road and shore allowances, and compensation for loss of use of the land and in lieu of privately held land. No private land is claimed.

It will argue Treaty 72 wasn't fair to the First Nations and that the Crown accepted a duty to protect the Saugeen Peninsula (now known as the Bruce Peninsula). SON signed Treaty 72 in return for reserve lands and for the proceeds of the sale of the rest of the land. The claim alleges the Crown breached those obligations.

The second part of the claim, brought in 2003 and merged with the original 1994 peninsula claim, seeks aboriginal title to portions of Lake Huron and Georgian Bay waterbeds in the full traditional territory from Tobermory to Goderich to Collingwood.

It includes no dry land, just the portions of waters offshore of those lands. No inland lakebeds or riverbeds in the SON traditional territory are claimed, other than some on the peninsula if they are Crown lands and subject to the Treaty 72 claim, Guirguis said.

If successful, the aboriginal title claim would give SON control of the surface and exclusive fishing rights. It also seeks government revenues received from the land.

Treaties between the Crown and SON don't mention lakes or waterbeds in the territory claimed, so the SON views them as theirs.

That's based on their ancestors' exclusive occupation of the area before the assertion of British sovereignty in the 1760s, and that SON never gave up its land rights in the territory, according to a 2016 newsletter updating the SON community about the legal action, which Guirguis and her law firm helped prepare.

Fish Hatchery (Al Sutter & Mike Smith)

Fin Clipping – We experienced an amazing turn out on April 2nd for fin clipping. The majority of fish were clipped during the afternoon session with the balance done during the evening session. A big "Thank You" to everyone who helped.

Our brown trout have been moved to the larger troughs to prepare space for the Rainbow Trout eggs which we will be collecting in the next week or so from Denny's Dam.

Our licence applications have been sent to the MNRF and we are waiting to receive our 2019 licences.

Heavy rain on April 18th caused some flooding issues in the hatchery. We had over 100 GPM coming into the hatchery, which is move than the overflow pipe could handle. A Sump Pump was installed in the concrete trough to pump out the extra water that accumulated. We will look at changing the overflow pipe this summer.

The pump has been placed back in the pond. Water in the pond is looking great.

Fish Advisory Committee (Ray Marklevitz)

Ray is setting up a hatchery tour on the morning of May 1st for the Sauble Sandpipers seniors.

The Fish Committee is meeting on April 29th to discuss several issues and prepare for the meeting and visit from Ken LeCroix of the MNR on May 7.

Ray Marklevitz has reported to MNRF four times in the past three weeks on infractions by the Commercial Fishing – nets improperly marked and set to close to the mouth of Gleason Brook.

There have been several incidents reported of down riggers getting caught in nets. Kevin Harders suggested contacting the Coast Guard as this becomes a personal safety issue on the waterways.

Ken Barrett received a Quote of \$200.00 to sandblast the hatchery trailer

We have nothing concrete to report on our appeal on the Biologist replacement.

O.F.A.H. (Kevin Harders)

Kevin Harders and Ray Marklevitz attended the OFHA quarterly Meeting for Zone H was held April 14th

Dennis Wiseman, Secretary of the OFAH and SSA Director spoke of the Lake Huron Hatchery Managers meeting this Past March 20th. Great networking and collective collaborations of the struggles the hatchery managers are finding, as well as solutions to other problems encountered by the managers where all talked amongst the 15-20 Hatchery Managers that attended the seminar that day.

Mike Evers,1st Vice Chair, OFAH, Zone H, Spoke of the increasing cases of rabies in the Southern Ontario area of Hamilton. Since January 2019 there have been 54 cases of Rabies. A warning from the city of Hamilton has been issued to be aware of the situation and be concerned of the significant rise in rabies cases. This is the first occurrence since 2005 and then again in 2015 when two Bull Mastiff dogs were infected after a fight with a raccoon in the back of an Animal Control Service Van.

Collingwood is now concerned about the increasing population of coyotes. As the Town of Collingwood is increasing in size, the homes are now becoming more stretched into the outskirts of town/ Coyote land. The Municipality of Collingwood currently has a bylaw that prohibits trapping and shooting in the municipality therefore the problem is ongoing. The Municipality is still in talks about the situation.

Peter Davis – Atlantic Salmon Habitat Tech did an excellent presentation on the results of the Atlantic salmon stocking program in Lake Ontario. The salmon are currently being stocked in three different sizes, Fry, Fall Fingerlings and Spring yearlings. Currently they are stocking four main rivers in Lake Ontario, The Cobourg Creek, Credit River, Dufferin Creek and the Ganaraska River. The OFAH is doing many stream rehabilitation programs to promote and improve better quality waters for the fish stocking programs. Anyone catching Atlantic Salmon in the Georgian Bay waters is encouraged to share information when and where they were caught to help understand the patterns the return of the Atlantics.
