**Fish Committee:** Had a visit with Ken Lacroix, it was proposed the Ministry take back then brown trout program as our fish are too small and the alternative of installing a recirculation water system of \$25,000 is not good financial sense. We propose a five year license not 1 year.

#### Fish Hatchery

- May 5<sup>th</sup> we collected rainbow trout eggs at Dennys Dam on the Saugeen River.
  We collected 147,000 eggs in two trips, the eggs where brought back to the hatchery. And
  fertilized then disinfected and placed in the upwelling trays. There was a lot of help at the
  Dam from the LHFC and the Ontario Steel Headers. Our members who helped where Kevin
  Harders, Stan McNeil, Gord Smith, Murray Garniss, Ray Marklevitz and Ben Turtell. Thank
  you.
- Our licences arrived on May 9<sup>th</sup>, signed and returned on May 10<sup>th</sup>. These licences are our aquaculture licence, our collection licence and our stocking licence.
- May 17<sup>th</sup> we had a meeting with Ken Laroix.Ken is the Manager. Upper Great Lakes Management Unit-Lake Huron.
- Fish Stocking at Gleason Brook was May 18<sup>th</sup>. Stocked 10,000 or our yearling Rainbow Trout. An amazing turnout of help made it a quick process. Thanks to everyone for your help. It is much appreciated.
- Stocking the remainder of our yearling rainbow trout will happen on June 8<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> at Colpoys creek.

#### Archery:

- We are now shooting outside every Tuesday evening. Youth 6 P.M. to 7 P.M. Families are shooting together from 7 P.M. to 8 P.M. and Adults only from 8 P.M. on.
  - Other than the Adults only time slot we are flexible if people cannot arrive on time. Many of our youth are involved in soccer and baseball.
- The new safety zone is working out exceptionally well. It really defines the staging zone and shooting line, this helps with safety awareness.
  - I have noticed that the stone dust is getting dragged into the clubhouse and has the potential to mark the flooring. I will be posting a sign outside to remind folks to wipe their feet before entering and we have added floor sweeping to our closing procedure.
- Several of our Youth Archery Members came out to Kids Fishing Day and had a great time.
   We have received positive comments from parents and the kids were still quite excited about it on Tuesday evening.
- I will be approaching the Archery Club for a couple of volunteers to help out on June 20th for the Rotary evening from 6:30 P.M. until 8 P.M.

• The 3-D trail should be cleared and set-up by the middle of June. We are going to order signs indicating the station number and a few directional arrows.

Many thanks go out to Bruce and Corrie Beacock for taking over the program, opening and closing for Archery, and keeping things going in general for us while I was gone for longer than expected.

Legislation: <u>Bill C-71</u> was passed in the Senate with 0 changes or edits. So much for the independent "Liberal" Senate.

The Liberal government is also considering additional changes/banning of certain firearms with the AR-15 at or near the top of the list. The AR-15 is already a restricted firearm with a max. magazine capacity of 5 rounds.

The government is also considering additional changes which it intends to make law without passing legislation in the house and without debate.
