There were cheers and applause as two floats entered by our club took part in the 2019 Wiarton Santa Claus Parade. Our archery and hatchery members worked hard preparing our entries for this parade, which attracts more than 30 organizations and is enjoyed by several thousand onlookers. In the days following the parade, it got rave reviews. Around town there were comments like "the best Santa Parade ever" and "what a great event for kids of all ages." And the Wiarton and District Chamber of Commerce "did a wonderful job staging this event."

The theme of the 2019 parade was "CANDYLAND". The main BPSA float design by the Archery Club reflected that theme displaying a giant gingerbread house with candy canes and other goodies attached. On top were red drink glasses to represent a gumdrop roof. The brightly lit float included large barber poles wrapped in wrapping paper. We had walking candy cane youngsters who were handing out free treats. Their outfits were made from large white Christmas tree bags wrapped in red tape that made them look like candy canes. Firearms Expert Hutter at BPSA

Respected firearms trainer Frank Hutter who is is the Chief Firearms Safety and Training Officer for the BPSA Handgun Club, grabbed the spotlight at a recent meeting of the 300-member Bruce Peninsula Sportsmen's Association (BPSA). Hutter, who has helped train thousands of hunters and sports shooters seeking firearms licenses, presented a 40-minute lesson on BLACK POWDER rifles and pistols. Black Powder guns are firearms that employ early firearm technology, and hand loaded ammunition.



Firearms safety is a major portion of all Frank's training sessions.

The BLACK POWDER world is one of unusual terms such as "flintlocks", "bore butter", "muzzle loaders", "wheel locks", and the most important term of all "safe handling and loading."

Hutter told BPSA members black powder guns have been used since the 12-hundreds. He said "guns play a role in the lives of millions of Canadians whether they are sports target shooters, collectors or hunters."



Frank also informed the audience of important changes to the interpretation of a loaded muzzle-loaded firearm. BPSA President Bruce Beacock said he was thrilled with the solid turnout for the Hutter information session. Said





Beacock "we have a richness of talent at BPSA. We hope to call on other members with expertise in all kinds of interesting outdoors related fields, to share their knowledge at future club meetings."

Stats Can. reports 26% of Canadian households have at least one firearm. 95% of firearm households own rifles. A much smaller percentage own pistols such as the ones used for target practice by the BPSA Handgun Club. An estimated 10 million guns are owned by civilians in Canada.

In 2020 the Bruce Peninsula Sportsmen's Association celebrates 58 years of conservation. Our non-profit volunteer based group began community work in the sixties. We boast the longest operating volunteer-run fish hatchery in Ontario. BPSA stocked 130-thousand rainbow and brown trout in 2019. In the spring we will stock 30-thousand rainbow trout yearlings. Over many years our 300 member club has stocked more than 4-million fish at several locations in Georgian Bay to boost our recreational fishery. Our club boasts many opportunities that offer you a chance to participate. They are our youth and adult archery programs, stocking or feeding fish, firearms safety training, handgun club, our invasive species awareness boot scrubber project and tree planting. Final BPSA Fish Stocking of 2019



They showed up on a bitterly cold Sunday morning to support our sports fishery. They ranged in age from four to eighty four. The action was at Gleason Brook East of Wiarton. Fourty-five enthusiastic souls took part in a bucket-brigade down a steep snowy path from our tanker trailer to the falls. At this location and at the mouth of the creek, we stocked 10,450 rainbow trout.

Earlier BPSA volunteers stocked 13,300 rainbow trout in Colpoy's Creek and another 5-thousand at Barrow Bay with help from members of the Barrow Bay and District Sport Fishing Association. BPSA often works with other outdoors clubs on improving our recreational fishery. Among those clubs are the Barrow Bay club, the Sydenham Sportsmen's Association, the Ontario Steelheaders and the Lake Huron Fishing Club. Our club President Bruce Beacock says "A BIG THANKS goes out to our fish stocking volunteers ...it was a great effort!!!!!! We couldn't do this without out you."





This volunteer effort is part of the Bruce Peninsula Sportsmen's Association (BPSA) fish stocking program. Other volunteer work includes fish feeding, tank maintenance at our hatchery and fin clipping. Since the sixties our community group has stocked more than four million rainbow and brown trout and salmon in Southwest Georgian Bay. The 300 member BPSA was established in the sixties to "preserve and enhance fish and wildlife." BPSA operates the longest running volunteer-run fish hatchery in Ontario.

We belong to the 40-member Ontario Community Hatchery Program (CHP) which is funded by the province and operated by the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters. Some of the costs involved with operating our fish stocking program are covered by the CHP.

BPSA is more than fish stocking. We have an active youth and adult archery program, a busy handgun club, firearms training classes, tree planting and our invasive species awareness "boot scrubber" effort. Our aim is to install 100 boot scrubber units from Owen Sound to Tobermory.

The next event on the BPSA schedule is our participation with a decorated float in the Wiarton District Chamber of Commerce annual Santa Clause Parade. It runs at 7pm on Saturday December 7, 2019 through downtown Wiarton and you are invited to cheer us on and say hi to Santa. The 300 member Bruce Peninsula Sportsmen's Association
