BPSA hosts OFAH winter Zone meeting



Wiarton, Ontario: It was a full house on January 15, 2023 as the 250-member Bruce Peninsula Sportsmen's Association (BPSA) hosted the winter meeting of Zone H of the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters (OFAH). This zone covers a wide area with delegates attending from as far away as Orillia, Shelburne, Barrie, Wasaga Beach and Kincardine. Zone H has over 11-thousand members. Zone Chair Mike Evers says these meetings give federation members a chance to meet with like minded individuals and provide opinions that are passed on to OFAH directors who decide federation policy.



Dozens of subjects were discussed by more than sixty delegates including:

- the threat of the spread of wild pigs and the "wild pig watch" by Ontario government agencies
- the advantages of using net pens to transition hatchery fish into the wild resulting in larger fish stocked and increasing their survival rate when released
- regional co-operation between volunteer-based fish stocking clubs
- OFAH zone grants to college and university students studying biology and other fields related to hunting and fishing



FIREARMS:

Delegates discussed federal government moves to ban a number of firearms, including some hunting rifles. Via a live av feed from Ottawa, Grey-Bruce-Owen Sound MP Alex Ruff joined us to discuss the issue.

Ruff is totally familiar with firearms having spent 25 years in the Canadian Military. The MP attacked Ottawa's firearms proposals as "doing nothing to reduce or prevent firearms crime in Canada." He reported "legally licensed firearms owners are the least likely to commit firearms crimes," and asked "why are they being unfairly targeted by the government" ?



During a question & answer session with Ruff OFAH members accused Ottawa of "banning some weapons trying to steal legally acquired firearms that hunters, collectors and target shooters have used for years."

Alex Ruff reminded us that he interjected at the Public Safety committee over the last minute amendments to Bill C-21 (Handgun freeze) to now include banning the majority of semi-auto hunting rifles.

https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=7IIJAJRJnns' Ruff urged every Canadian firearms owner to write protest letters to all MP's, the Prime Minister, and other Ministers involved in the controversy, to express outrage on the federal firearms moves.



Mechalko explained that AMBASSADORS are anglers and hunters who bring fresh younger views to the table to determine the future direction of OFAH.

Zone H chair Mike Evers congratulated BPSA for hosting the event which he called "well organized". Draw prizes were handed out including a \$75.00 Zone H attendance incentive prize. 
2023 Youth Firearms Safety Program is up and running.



The BPSA has been providing a six-week Youth Firearms Safety Program for over 20 years. The goal of the program is to safely introduce community youngsters to the safe handling of firearms in a controlled and fun setting. The BPSA provides single shot "right size" .22 rifles along with eye and hearing protection for all the participants and they are supervised by one-onone experienced safety officers who mentor and ensure safety measures are in place at all times.

Krista and Rob Quesnel head up the program where the youngsters are graded on scores and Safety. On Sunday, January the 23rd. We had 24 youngsters signed up and went through an introductory orientation followed by two range sessions each. Bullseye and novelty targets are used to help keep the interest high. They are scored on their safety and on their acuracy. Awards will be given out at the end of the 6 weeks. Not too late to sign up.

The BPSA indoor range is inspected and approved by the office of the Chief Firearms Officer (O.P.P.). Are the participants having fun? A picture is worth 1,000 words. Al Hunter













Fur, Fins and Feather **Recipes**

HAWAIIAN VENISION 1 pound venison steaks 1/4 cup flour 1/4 cup butter 1/2 cup boiling water 1 teaspoon salt 2 to 3 green peppers 1/2 cup pineapple chunks

Cut steaks into 1-inch cubes, cover with flour, and brown in hot fat. Add water and salt and simmer until tender. Clean peppers, cut into 1-inch squares and boil 10 minutes. Then drain. Add pineapple chunks and pepper squares to browned meat. Pour

Hawaiian sauce (below) over meat mixture and simmer 5 minutes. Serve over Chinese noodles or cooked rice. Serves 4-6.

Hawaiian Sauce 2 1/2 teaspoons cornstarch 1/2 cup pineapple juice 1/4 cup vinegar 1/2 cup sugar 2 1/2 t. soy sauce Combine ingredients and cook until sauce thickens.

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Removing the "Y" Bone form a Pike

Is is important to keep the pike cool after being caught. Fillet and freeze or eat, as soon as possible. The flesh loses flavour and gets mushy quickly in warm weather. (That's why these fish taste best when caught in winter.) Pike should be 1kg. or larger for your first attempt at this deboning method. Begin by removing the filled from the fish in whatever manner your prefer. I like to cut the pelvic (belly) fins first, slit the belly open and removed entrails. Cut from belly to neck just behind the gill, cover and then lay the knife flat and run it along the back bone, removing fillet at the tail section. Do not strip the skin from the fillet at this time.

Now, we are at #1 of the six part illustration. Each sequence is a view of the removed filled laying skin-side-down and an even view on the left showing the location of the "Y" bone inside the flesh. Starting with a sharp knife, remove the rib bones by slipping the knife just under them, starting at the top of the head and, working down and towards the tail. Locate the ends of the exposed "Y" bones by lightly scraping your knife across them so that they are better exposed to view.


#2 Using the sharp fillet knife, gently cut downward just above exposed "Y" bones, until you feel blade touch bone again. Work towards tail end. By lightly running knife in this cut, you can hear and fell it running along the bones.

#3 Starting at head end, insert knife into cut, pushing it along "Y" bone towards back until it lays flat. Continue to slide knife along long part of "Y, but do not cut through the top of the back.

#4 Continue layering back cut meat to expose the bone.

#5 Make a shallow cut along the lateral line. #6 Now, bring the blade under the exposed bones, removing them as you work towards the tail end. On large fish, make a slit to the skin along either side of the "L" bones. Remove skin and pull out cut strip of "L" bones. You now have a boneless pike fillet because the thick back portion of the flesh has been slit by removing the "Y" bone. You have a fillet that is almost an even thickness throughout. If freezing, place the fillets in a plastic bag with water. I use empty mild bags cut open at one end. They are strong and will hold enough fillets for 4 people. When using, that, place in non-metal container and cover with beer. Marinate for at least 2 hours. Remove and pat dry. Prepare by whatever method you prefer and the fillets will taste almost fresh!
